Pairing natural wonders such as shells and skulls; scientific instruments such as globes and telescopes; coins, jewels and antiquities; and works of art, these cabinets were amassed by wealthy Europeans as a way of documenting their travels and striving to understand the world at large by creating a world in miniature.
